#### The Curious Savage



# **OHIO MODEL UNITED NATIONS**

Thirty-five Benjamin Logan High School students participated in the Ohio Model United Nations three-day global education simulation experience held in Columbus, OH in November. The students learned about the complete operations of the United Nations and its role as the world's largest international peacekeeping and humanitarian organization. The students become delegates of a selected nation in order to write, present and debate issues affecting the nations and peoples of the world. Through role-playing, the students presented culturally based talent, participated in global education contests and debated current issues from the agenda of the United Nations.









# STATE TESTING

# State Testing

There are many new requirements for state testing for all students in grades 9-11 this year. They include:

Classes of 2018 and beyond: End-of-course tests in English Language Arts I and II, Algebra I, Geometry, Biology or Physical Science (class of 2018 only), American History and American Government. Students must attain a total of 18 points on these tests. Each test is a maximum of 5 points. Also, students must earn at least 4 points in Math (Algebra I and Geometry), 4 points in English (ELA I & II), and 6 points between Social Studies and Science (Biology, American History, and American Government.)

The state of Ohio is now also requiring schools to administer ACT to all juniors. We will be giving ACT to all juniors on March 21st. This test can also fulfill graduation requirements, if students earn a minimum of 18 in English and 22 in Math. Juniors must have a reading subscore of 21 or higher, and freshmen and sophomores must have a reading subscore of 22 or higher.

Seniors are still required to pass OGT.
